MAREP Reporting

We should all view MAREP as a safety issue.

The criteria and procedures for reporting are well documented on page 22 of our District Roster. A reporting form is shown on page 23. [Editor's note: the 2012 Roster was mailed with the August Issue of PY.] As well, there is a printable version of the reporting form accessible from our PMD web site. We should have this form on our boat. It will help to ensure correct reporting procedures.

See any Navigation aids not as shown on your chart, either

missing or repositioned? Any new Nav. Aids that are not on your chart? Submit a report to your Squadron's MAREP Officer. And include any relevant photos.

Have a Smart phone on your boat? They will provide a very accurate GPS positions, and a source of good photos for your MAREP Reporting.

Your reports are passed on to Canadian Hydrographic Services (those folks who make your Marine Charts), and to Canadian Coast Guard who may issue a Notice to Mariner (NORMAR). Your report may help fellow boaters in avoiding dangerous situations.

Wish to keep your Government provided publication up-to-date? Subscribe to monthly NOTMAR updated for the Canadian Coast Guard publications: Marine Charts; Sailing Directions; Small Craft Guide; and List of Lights, Buoys and Fog signals, by going to: notmar.gc.ca. It's a worthwhile safety service for all of us boaters.

"A test was performed on the new boat design [Type 1, 9 meter RHIB with "ICE" console]. Unit #5 will receive our new boat "Vigilant" in the new year. Check out the two videos below of the roll over test of the first Type 1 boat. One was filmed by RCM SAR the other by Shockwave with an underwater camera. Weights were placed at the stern and in the console to simulate engine, equipment and crew weight. You'll notice the boat lists a little after the test and is a little stern heavy, that's because some compartments filled with water. 14 seconds to re-right." The Virtues of VICE

On June 27^{th,} 2012, seven BCA sailing vessels assembled in Ucluelet Harbour for a skippers' meeting in anticipation of the VICE (Vancouver Island Cruising Experience) start the following day. Most of the 22 sailors present had never met before. Tom and Dawn Baker had volunteered and co-ordinated this event through written, verbal and many an e-mail communication over the previous months.

VICE participants were Tapen Zee (Coast 34), Tradewind Seeker (Transpac 49), Gr8 Escape (Hunter 44). Scott Free (Hylas 42). Atrevida and Heart and Soul (Sceptres 43) and Vakasa (Lagoon 42 TPI), a cruising catamaran. The goal of the VICE exercise is to gain blue water experience by sailing out into the Pacific for a shakedown cruise. This year's course was on a 248° true heading to an artificial "destination," marked by co-ordinates. It was about 150nm west of Ucluelet, which was as far out as some of the participants' insurances permitted. This was a great opportunity to test boats and crew - cooking, eating, sleeping at sea, using offshore equipment, watch keeping and trying out communication systems.

It was a mixed bunch of sailors, some already with open ocean experience but more with very little or none. Each boat set its own yardstick to measure the success of its venture. This might be to try out overnight sailing "under the stars", participating in a watch keeping system or simply

testing one's reaction to being out of sight of land. It could be practicing with HAM, AIS, radar or new equipment. Determining how the boat would perform over an extended period at sea, possibly in heavy weather? Or maybe to train the dog to go potty at sea - unsuccessful – he held on for 24 hours!

Although the weather forecast predicted 20+ knot winds and plenty of rain, no decision was made to defer the proposed June 28 departure to await a more benign "weather window." Much camaraderie had been established on the dock that afternoon as preparations had been made, and there was courage and strength in numbers after all! The Coast Guard and Vessel Traffic were to be notified of the departure. Communications were planned to be kept by VHF and/or SSB, relaying between boats as the fleet inevitably separated.

It turned out to be every bit as wet and windy as forecast, and then some! Skies and seas were leaden; waves seemed to come from all sides as though thrust up like boiling water. As the shelf of La Perouse Bank fell behind, waves became higher – up to 3 meters at times - and seemed more menacing. Winds blew at 18-25 knots steadily for the first 20 hours and there were intermittent 35 knot rain squalls. With mainsails single or double-reefed and much reduced headsails, the boats ploughed ahead at a remarkable pace with a predominantly beam wind. Rigging and sails strained

while autopilots fought to maintain the course.

The experience almost everyone shared was the dreaded mal de mer. One crew member became very sick almost immediately and went below, never to be seen again during the voyage. Hardly a morsel of the carefully preprepared meals was served that first day, "queasiness" or much worse being epidemic. Plain cookies, marmalade sandwiches, crystalline ginger and bottles of water were the most popular fare on our boat. Vakasa's sweet and sour pork stayed rock solid in the freezer!

It has to be said the transdermal patch (scopolamine) was worth its weight in gold; even the dry mouth side-effect prompted the wearer to remain hydrated. Many non-users of anti-emetics, however, paid the price. Even late application of the patch proved effective. Sturgeron users were also happy with their choice. Vakasa, the catamaran. found forereaching at 1 knot "eased the quease" considerably. One boat's first mate was reported to be too scared to be sick, and being so mad at her captain for putting her in this horrible situation, turned out to be a trooper.

Despite the great plans, radio communications which were initially plentiful became scarcer as the day progressed and in many cases halted altogether. VHF seemed largely impotent when boats were out of sight.

Our designated communications' boat attempted unsuccessfully to contact the on-shore HAM operator - someone who was to issue e-mail progress reports to families. HAM-ing may be as much art as science? It definitely needs practice and experience. Tapan Zee had success with their own HF onshore contact. The MMSI numbers for DSC were shared only *after* the expedition and worked well then.

VICE is a quite individual trial, there being no prize or certificate awarded to the two boats (the Sceptres) which reached the designated longitude co-ordinate of 128.85W. The original latitude would have entailed much beating southwards to "the mark" as the wind had veered during the night. When the distance off-shore was reached, the task was deemed accomplished and both boats (out of sight or contact with each other) headed for home. The other boats chose their turn-around points closer to shore when each one decided they had "had enough."

Arriving back in Ucluelet after about 48 hours at sea, following some motor-sailing in light winds on the return journey, was a joyous event. There were hugs and congratulations, survival stories, much de-briefing and then deep sleep. Everyone was delighted to be back safe and sound without any catastrophes. As the day went by and appetites revived, the "Experience" seemed more and more worth while. Generally it was agreed it had "not been fun," but going out in such bad weather had been worth it. No pain, no gain.

Most sailors were pleased with how their boats handled under the rough conditions but valuable lessons were also learned: the necessity of tying down equipment more thoroughly, the difficulties of reefing in high waves, the inadequacy of some rain gear, the paucity of catering required or the extra grab rails and tethers needed.

Everyone vowed to work harder on communications, both with equipment and the skills to operate it. Successful hailing of larger vessels and Tofino Traffic proved useful and reassuring. Tapan Zee loved their new windvane which "held the course even in big rollers." Vakasa has decided not to go out in a gale voluntarily! In fact, they think they will now use the 30-60 nm route offshore on their trip south later this summer, (rather than heading 100 nm offshore), seeking shelter if the weather turns bad. Gr8 Escape realizes the decision to sail or not to sail should be made individually, to suit each boat and crew, rather than simply going with the flow. Scott Free IV and Tradewind Seeker found heavy weather sailing aboard their Hylas 42 and Transpac 49 to be a very wet experience. (Staying in the exposed cockpit to avoid seasickness below resulted in everyone being cold and soaked.) Wearing glasses in the rain and with the sea spray was an exercise in futility. One crew member wore his swim mask over his glasses much easier to clean - and kept the salt water out of his eyes.

The whole fleet discovered that underestimating the debilitating effects of seasickness is not smart. Even the hardiest may succumb, possibly endangering the safety of all aboard. No more machismo please!

Though at times this VICE had its dark moments it also proved to have many virtues. Friends were made; joys and sorrows were shared; and a new confidence has grown. Each owner now knows his boat more intimately and is better prepared for future adventures - be they local or in far off places. Aside from the sense of accomplishment other sweet memories endure: the bioluminescent trail carved in the ocean at night, the dolphins swimming alongside, sharing the empty ocean with blowing whales or the unexpected visit by an albatross at dawn. Thank you from everyone to Tom and Dawn who worked so diligently to make VICE 2012 a rewarding and instructive experience for us all.

CPS is years 75 years old.

The organization had its start in 1938, when three members of the Windsor Yacht Club crossed the Ambassador Bridge into Detroit, Michigan. Under the direction of the Detroit Power Squadron, Fred Dane, George Ruel, and G. William Bowman passed the USPS Junior Piloting Course. They soon formed the first Squadron in Canada, Windsor Power Squadron, with G.William Bowman as its first

Commander. He later became the first Chief Commander of Canadian Power Squadrons, the organization that, later, became known as Canadian Power and Sail Squadrons/Escadrilles canadiennes de plaisance, or CPS-ECP.

In 1950, the membership doubled. In 2013, as we begin our anniversary year, CPS has 26,000 members in 155 squadrons across Canada.

Over the year, Port Hole will

celebrate the 75th anniversary, but CPS is more than just an iconic organization, and CPS history is woven from the stories of each individual who is or was a member.

- Sizes small to XL can be ordered at a cost of \$44.95 for a short sleeve shirt and \$49.95 for a long sleeve shirt.
- For sizes 2XL to 3XL add \$5.50 per shirt.
- In all cases prices include taxes, shipping and handling. Please allow approximately six weeks for delivery.





In keeping with Mustang Survival's commitment to the highest levels of quality and safety, we are notifying the public of an urgent advisory for specific Hydrostatic (H.I.T.) inflatable PFDs manufactured during April and May of 2012. A portion of these PFDs may be subject to delayed or non-inflations. To determine if you are impacted by this precautionary advisory please reference the instructions below.

The following Mustang Survival products are affected:

- MA7214 HIT inflatable re-arm kit
- MD3153 Deluxe Inflatable PFD with HIT
- MD3154 Deluxe Inflatable PFD with HIT (with harness)
- MD3157 Inflatable Work Vest with HIT

<u>Step 1:</u> Does your PFD or re-arm kit have a round orange Hammar HIT inflator? If yes proceed to Step 2. For re-arm kits only, please skip to Step 6

For Steps 2 through 4, please refer to the sewn approval label on your PFD.

Step 2: If your product is marked Made in Canada proceed to step 3

<u>Step 3:</u> Look for **MDxxxx** model number on the approval label. If it matches one of the model numbers listed above proceed to Step 4

Step 4: If the MFG DATE is Apr2012 or May2012 proceed to step 5

If you answer NO to any of steps 1-4, your PFD is OK and not part of this advisory.

If your PFD is on the list of models above and was Made in Canada during April or
May of 2012 then proceed to Step 5.

<u>Step 5:</u> If you have answered YES to all of the steps above, you will now need to look for a LOT# on the CO2 cylinder that resides within the bladder. This number can be seen through the yellow bladder fabric.

- · Manually unpack your PFD by opening the zippers and unfolding your PFD.
- Find the CO2 cylinder that is attached to the round inflator.
- · Press the yellow bladder fabric against the cylinder to read the label.
- The Lot number can be clearly identified through the fabric

<u>Step 6:</u> if your CO2 cylinder is marked with LOT# 404121 or 404122 please contact our customer service group immediately at 1-800-526-0532 for further instructions and to arrange for a replacement inflator assembly. If your CO2 cylinder is not marked with LOT#404121 or 404122, it is OK and you can repack your PFD for use.
