Safety Tips...

Night lighting requirements for commercial vessels

After the tragic accident at last years Symphony of Fire, several of us who had recently completed Piloting class began to look in our books for the lighting requirements for tug boats under tow at night. We found nothing. None of the books (including the Coast Guard's safe boating publication) we had on hand contained this information.

Finally, out of desperation wanting to know not only what the regulations were, but where the information could be found, I phoned the coast guard. Where is this information hidden? It was a relief to know that even they had to get back to me. It turns out it is in the **International Collision Regulations** as well as in the **Canadian Shipping Act and Regulations** (www.tc.gc.ca). The requirements are as follows:

A towing vessel at night must display two all around vertical white lights and a white stern light with a yellow light above. If the tow length (measured from the stern of the tug to the stern of the tow) is greater than 200 m the tug must have three vertical all around white lights. In addition, the tow must have all around white lights at both bow and stern. Log booms will have all around white lights at either edge of the boom both bow and stern (these lights are small and may be hard to see).

If a fishing vessel is trawling at night it must display a white stern light and two all around mast lights, the upper one green and the lower one white. Any other fishing vessel must display two all around mast lights, the upper one red and the lower one white.


